A new single and renewed spirit.

Mary Zilba stars in the number one show in the history of Canadian television, is a former Miss Ohio and a Miss America contestant, and has released seven top 40 hits in Canada, but she's as down-to-earth as the rolling farmlands in Ohio.

The 1981 Central Catholic graduate is the fan favorite on the hit series, "Real Housewives of Vancouver," primarily because of her kindness and approachability.

"When people tell me I am an inspiration to them, I find it almost bewildering," Mary says. "I am 100% myself on the show. I think that comes from how and where I was raised." Mary, who has six siblings and grew up in southeastern Michigan, says "My parents (George and Mary Zilba, 1956 Central Catholic alumni) taught me to always be a lady and to treat others the way I want to be treated."

Mary's singing career was launched when she sang the National Anthem at the Orange Bowl championship game. It was a tremendous boost for the CCHS graduate who says, "I didn't know I had a voice until I joined the Glee Club at Central." Mary credits Carolyn Seaman, Central Catholic's Glee Club advisor at the time, with helping her to develop her talent and giving her opportunities to perform solos throughout her high school years.

Mary earned a degree in Broadcast Journalism from the University of Toledo, and worked as a broadcaster, T.V. host, and creator and producer of "Eye on Ft. Lauderdale," a popular Florida travel series. She later signed with Giant Records and moved to Los Angeles.

A move to British Columbia resulted in Mary's seven Top 40 hits and music videos that led the charts on Canada's Much Music and Much More Music channels.

While her professional career gave her the opportunity to work in a variety of mediums, Mary considers herself first and foremost a mother. One of her sons, who was diagnosed at age 6 with Tuberous Sclerosis, a rare, multi-system genetic disease, is the inspiration for Mary's latest single, "Hero."

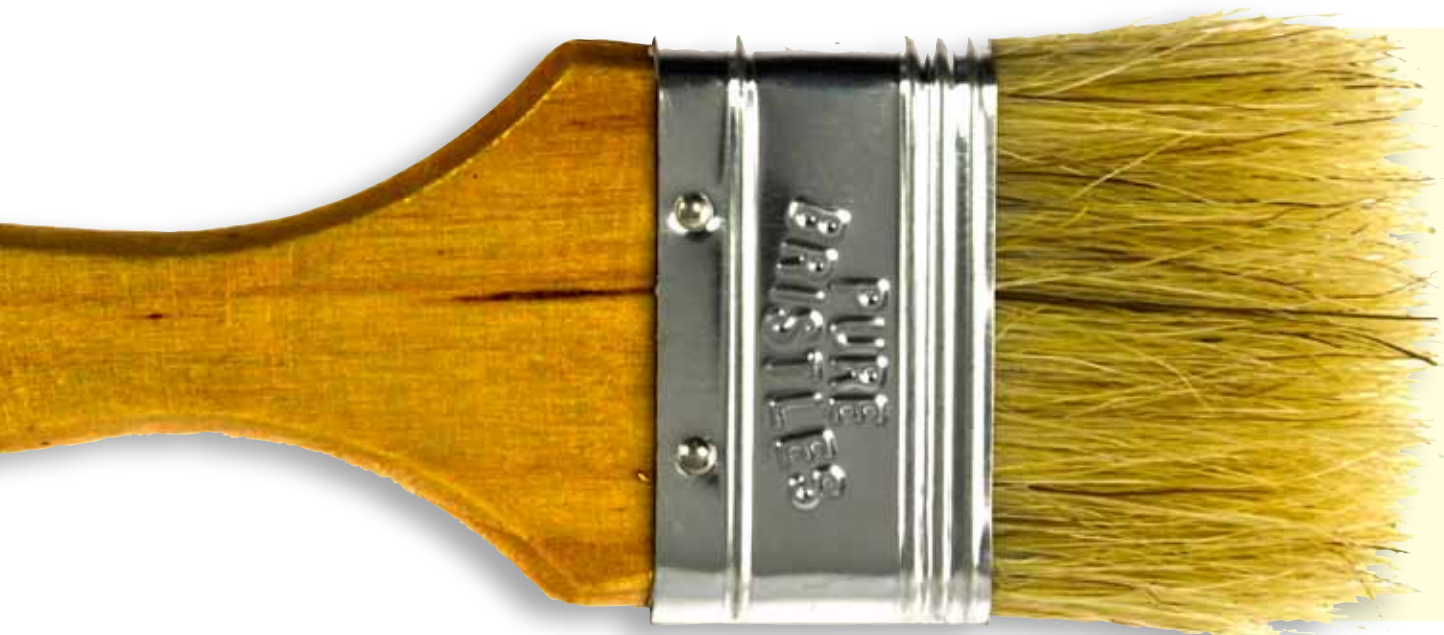
"Through it all, I think I have stayed true to who I am," says Mary. That, she says, is a testament to how she was raised and where she went to school.

Isaac is now drawing caricatures at parties and events throughout the Northwest Ohio and Southeast Michigan area, setting up at high school proms and graduation parties, birthday parties, wedding receptions, and more. He also does illustration and logo design work, and has illustrated one children's book, *Cheeky's Security Blanket*, and is currently in the process of illustrating another one.

Isaac was always interested in art, but says that his teachers at Central Catholic helped him to nurture that interest and believe that it was something he could really devote himself to professionally, rather than just as a hobby. "Art 4 was particularly helpful, and the introductory class had a lot of good lessons in thinking about art that were very important," Isaac explains.

Scott took art fundamentals, drawing, graphics, and design classes at Central Catholic and earned a Bachelor of Science in graphic design at Ferris State University located in Big Rapids, Michigan. He currently works as a designer with Spoke in downtown Toledo.

Although Scott says he didn't take his art classes very seriously at first, the classes at Central Catholic were very helpful. "By the time I took the graphics class, I knew that some fusion of technology and art was the way to go for me. But then I took Design with Ms. Hudson and realized that art made off of the computer screen is also really exciting - so I still spend my free time on photography and paper crafts when I'm finished working on pixels."

"I've always been interested in art, more or less from growing up with my older siblings who got to take all the cool art classes in high school or college while I, on the other hand, was still in elementary school learning how to craft with safety scissors and chunky paints," Scott says. "But where CCHS came into play was confirming my interest in creating art and that using computers was a good way to pursue that."

At that time, the classroom had a working dark room, and Jessica fell in love with the art of photography. She continued on to Mr. Wilson's Ceramics class, and then to Honors Art with Ms. Bartkavage. She attended Bowling Green State University and earned a Bachelor's of Fine Arts in art education, with a specialization in photography. She is currently teaching art to grades 1-12 at St. John's Elementary and High School in Delphos, Ohio.

"In Mrs. Hudson's class, I loved the process of developing my own film and watching my photographs change in the dark room under the developing chemicals," Jessica says. "As a sophomore in high school I knew I wanted to do that for the rest of my life. The faculty at CCHS fostered my creativity. They encouraged me to grow as an artist, and they gave me confidence that I would succeed in college and the professional world."

Jake attended the Savannah College of Art and Design in Savannah, Georgia, where he received his B.F.A in illustration and took some courses in graphic design and printmaking.

Jake currently lives in Indianapolis, Indiana where he works as a graphic designer and production designer for Angie's List. He creates and lays out their monthly magazine and their new interactive magazine version for the iPad. Jake is also a mixed media artist. He has displayed his work in galleries in Toledo and Bowling Green, Ohio; Savannah and Atlanta, Georgia; Ann Arbor, Michigan; and Indianapolis, Indiana.

"I think the classes at Central Catholic were helpful in preparing me for college due to the instructors," Jake says. "It was eye opener when I went to college and saw all the different opportunities within the field of art. 2013 Architect of the Year

It was probably a sign. When she was young, Mary Glowacki '73 and her sister, Judy, would rake leaves in their family's yard, except rather than make big piles, they created floor plans out of the leaves.

Mary, who was named Toledo Architect of the Year for 2013 by The Toledo Chapter of the American Institute of Architects (AIA), was the first female to join the organization in 1982 and its first female president in 1998. She was also one of a handful of women studying engineering technology, environmental design and architecture at The University of Toledo, Miami University and Ohio State University, where she earned her Associate's, Bachelor's and Master's degrees, respectively.

Being one of few women in the field, however, never slowed Mary's ambition. "I may have had to prove myself sometimes, but I always just joined in and didn't let anything stand in my way," says Mary.

Her career has included working for some of Toledo's top architectural and design groups, including Stough and Stough Architects, Poggemeyer Design Group, Vetter Design Group, and SSOE Group.

One of her favorite projects was St. Ann's Catholic Church in Fremont, Ohio, the home parish of the late Bishop James Hoffman.

"Being Catholic and working on a Catholic church was a tremendous experience," she says. "When they opened the doors to the renovated church, Bishop Hoffman had tears in his eyes."

Today, Mary owns her own business, Mary L. Glowacki, AIA Architect LLC, and lives in the Old West End, her home with her husband, Ed, for the past 29 years.

Robert Mazur CLASS OF 1956

Robert Mazur '56 is one of the United States' most exceptional artists over age 60. He earned his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in design and his Master of Fine Arts from Bowling Green State University, and shortly after graduating, he joined the art faculty at BGSU.

During his 33-year career at BGSU, Bob served as director of graduate studies, head of recruitment, head of two-dimensional studies, and acting director of the School of Art, and he was honored with several awards for excellence in teaching, service, and creativity. He retired in 1998 as Professor Emeritus from the BGSU School of Art.

Throughout his career, Bob has been featured in over 120 one-man shows nationwide, and his paintings are in over a dozen institutional collections and galleries. For more than three decades, Bob has taken inspiration from photographs of water, underwater life, and moving water. The *Water* series has become his signature series.

Bob has invited several classes of Central Catholic art students to his Bowling Green studio over the years to share his knowledge of art, and he has donated several works to the Central Catholic dinner auction.

In March 2009, Bob was featured in *The Artist's Magazine* and was chosen as one of the top 10 artists from more than 1,500 applicants.

He is the new guy in town, but his experience in education and innate leadership skills are steeped in Catholic education. Tom Maj, Central Catholic’s first lay president, considers his job a vocation. He considers Central Catholic’s students its greatest assets. He believes no one should lead in a vacuum. And he envisions Central Catholic to be a beacon, not only to those in Toledo, but also to those across the country through its programs and alumni.

Tom, most recently the president of Grand Rapids Catholic Secondary Schools in Michigan, comes to Central Catholic with firsthand knowledge of the challenges Catholic schools face today. While at the helm in Grand Rapids, Tom successfully led the restructuring of operations for two schools, all while focusing on what he considers the bottom line of Catholic schools: successful graduates who share their God-given talents in a global world.

Tom is known for his open door policy and focus on communication. In the short time since his arrival at Central Catholic, our students have quickly recognized that conversations with the president are more the norm than the exception.

Tom devoted his initial months to meeting with faculty and staff to get a pulse on the organization. He has been encouraged by the level of passion and commitment to the success of Central Catholic from those who lead our students. He is confident that our faculty and staff are prepared to meet any challenges and new directions to ensure the longevity of Central Catholic.

Tom also met with the presidents of the University of Toledo, Lourdes University and Mercy College, as well as with many of Central Catholic’s donors, an effort he said is critical to expanding the recognition of the school.

“It’s a different kind of leadership in Catholic schools today,” says Tom. “We are not leading by ourselves. If we want to make sure Central Catholic will survive – and thrive – we must partner with businesses and listen to what those in our community are saying and watch what they are doing.”

With Central’s board moving from an advisory to a governing role, including financial and operational oversight, leadership will include more of the global effort that Tom believes successful models embody today.

As for our students, Tom believes a growing knowledge of the world helps bring them closer to the world of God, which is what true Catholic education is all about.

At the end of the day,” Tom says, “My job is to make sure that Central Catholic serves the Church and Toledo for another 100 years.”

A sense of goodness

Several years ago, the Central Catholic High School football team was playing in Columbus, Ohio.

During the game, one of the referees suffered a heart attack and fell to the ground. While on the field with rescue personnel, Fr. Dennis Hartigan glanced back at the Central Catholic team. “All of the boys were on their knees, praying the Rosary,” he said. “Later, I asked one of the coaches who told the boys to pray and he told me that no one had; they did it on their own.” “That is a testament to the faith and Catholic identity that I’ve witnessed in our students time and time again,” said Fr. Hartigan, who will bid farewell to CCHS on July 1.

“If you let students know that you believe in them, they rarely disappoint,” said Fr. Hartigan, who became President of the school in 2004.

One of Fr. Hartigan’s first ideas after being named President was to hold the school’s Opening Mass on the front lawn of the school. The idea was so well received that it has since become a school tradition.

“The willingness of everyone to try something new showed me how flexible Central Catholic is and that it’s really all about the students,” he said.

Over the last nine years, Fr. Hartigan has been instrumental in numerous changes and enhancements. During his tenure, the school introduced One Connected Community, which provides each incoming freshman with a laptop computer. Central Catholic also became the first high school in Northwest Ohio

and the first Catholic high school in the state to be named an International Baccalaureate World School.

Fr. Hartigan also played a pivotal role in securing an additional \$3 million donation from Denver industrialist and philanthropist Charles P. Gallagher, class of 1956, and his wife, Diane (Bertling) Gallagher ’58. The gift allowed the school to complete the Gallagher Athletic Complex. Fr. Hartigan also had the pleasure of watching the Fighting Irish football team win the 2005 Division II State Championship.

And to help the community recognize that Central Catholic understands the importance of giving back, Fr. Hartigan assisted in creating the school’s Covenant Partners Program.

The program has established dozens of partnerships between Central Catholic and area businesses, educational institutions, and organizations. “We want Toledo to know that we are always here to help and to be a good neighbor to all.”

Fr. Hartigan will be returning to his roots of sorts, the Salesians of Don Bosco, the second largest Catholic religious order in the world. When he leaves his cherished Central Catholic, Fr. Hartigan said he will miss the camaraderie with the students, the laughter, and the teachers and staff who live the mission of Catholic education each day.

“I always knew that if I was having a bad day, I could just step out of my office into the hallways and the students’ spirits would lift me up. There is a sense of goodness here at Central Catholic; you can feel it.”

The 2013 Bishop's Cross recipients are **Sarah Hunter** and **Aaron Powers**. The Bishop's Cross Award is presented to an outstanding young man and woman in CCHS's graduating class and is the most respected and prestigious award granted to a senior who exhibits the gifts of the Holy Spirit, self-discipline, a sense of social responsibility and a high level of academic achievement in religious studies.

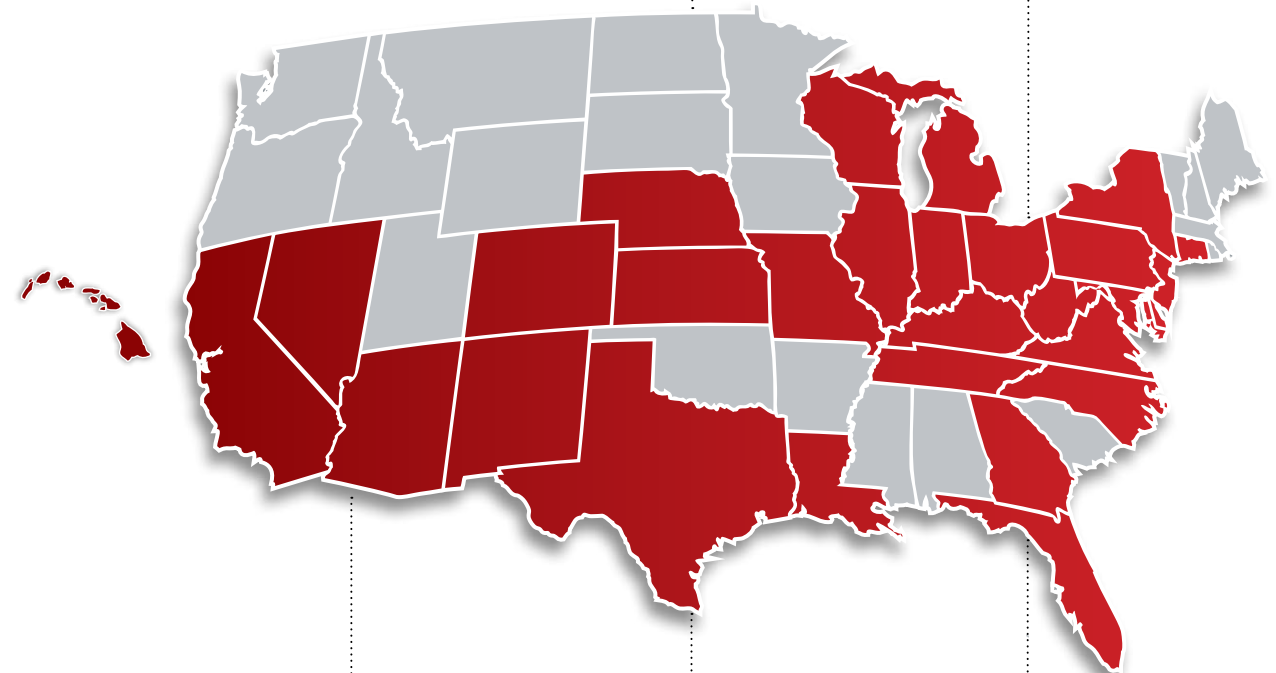

International Student Finds Home in Technology Department

P

atrapee "Pat" Pongtana, a senior from Thailand, was named one of two student technology directors and awarded a \$500 scholarship for his enthusiasm, leadership, and strong media skills. He and senior Nate Shull share the responsibilities of the director position, including managing other students, setting up for live events such as school Masses and assemblies, streaming of daily announcements and sporting events, and running the video board in the football stadium.

According to Multi-Media and Media Tech teacher D.J. Foy, "Pat was chosen for this role because of his attention to detail and his commitment. Even during the first couple of weeks of class he was hanging around

the classroom after school working on his own media projects. I could tell he was truly dedicated to his craft."

"Pat was already very interested and working hard with technology before he came here," says D.J. "I do believe the amount of technology as well some of the ambitious projects we have at CCHS have given him more opportunity to go after his goals."

Pat plans to attend college in Santa Monica, California to study computer engineering. He is not sure yet whether he will remain in the United States once he finishes college, but he thinks it would be better if he did because there is more work available in the technology field here than in Thailand.

Central Catholic currently has two exchange students from Switzerland and three students from China who have F-1 visas to study in the United States, along with Pat who has an F-1 visa and is from Thailand.

Central Catholic Art Students Participate in Million Bones Project

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wenty-seven honors advanced art and ceramics students at Central Catholic High School participated in the One Million Bones project organized by Students Rebuild.

This is a collaborative art project that involves students from all over the United States and abroad sculpting handmade bones – out of whatever material they choose - that were laid out on the National Mall in Washington D.C. on April 28. The CCHS students made their bones out of clay.

The goal was to have one million bones to display, and a \$1 donation will be made by the Bezos Family Foundation for every bone that students create. The purpose is to raise awareness of genocide and other mass atrocities, and all proceeds will go to CARE for their work in Somalia and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. The bones are a symbol of solidarity with victims and survivors of ongoing violence and conflict in these countries.

Wrestling team places 2nd in C.I.T. Tournament and Districts

The entire wrestling team represented Central Catholic well this season with second place finishes in the Catholic Invitational Tournament. At the C.I.T., Alex Mossing won an individual title at 138 pounds and earned the tournament's Outstanding Wrestler Award. Freshman Josh Portillo earned an individual title at 106 pounds. The team also retained the Toledo Catholic Cup this season by defeating both St. Francis and St. John's, winning 22 out of 28 individual matches at the meet.

The wrestling team finished second overall at the district meet, with Nate Hagan and Alex Mossing each placing first in their weight classes. Nate, Alex, and Matt Pool went on to represent CCHS at the state meet.

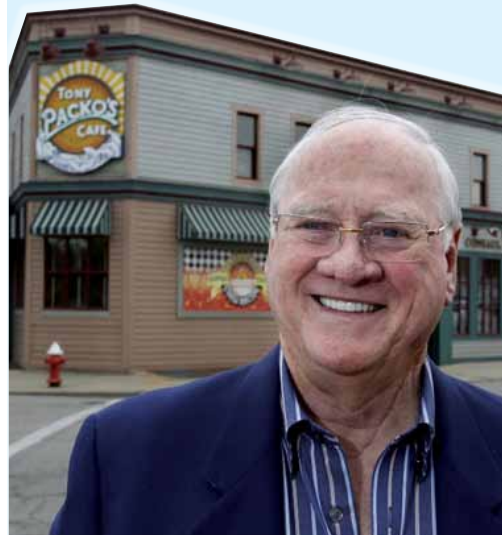

Robert Bennett, the founder of the Burger King restaurant franchise in the Toledo area, died at the age of 76 after a brief illness. Bob was the chairman and chief executive of Bennett Management Corporation.
